The mission of the Boy Scouts of America is to prepare young people to make ethical and moral choices over their lifetimes by instilling in them the values of the Scout Oath and Law.


#### **SCOUT OATH**

#### **BOY SCOUTS**

For boys who are 11 through 17 years of age. The motto is *Be Prepared* and the slogan is *Do a Good Turn Daily*. Boy Scouting uses outdoor activities such as camping, aquatics, and hiking to achieve the aims of Scouting.

#### **VARSITY SCOUTING**

For young men 14 through 17 years of age. The program is built on five fields of emphasis: advancement, high adventure, personal development, service, and special programs and events.

#### **VENTURING**

For young men and women 13 through 20 years of age. The purpose is to provide positive experiences to help young people mature and to prepare them to become responsible and caring adults.

#### **EXPLORING**

For young men and women 13 through 20 years of age. It is a work-based program with five areas of emphasis: career opportunities, life skills, citizenship, character education, and leadership.
