**Camp Lawton** - Camp Lawton sits on 72 acres in the Catalina mountains about sixty minutes from Tucson where mountain biking and hiking trails are abundant. In the summer it is generally 20 degrees cooler than Tucson. Camp Lawton is a great winter playground and it only minutes below Ski Valley. Many improvements have been ongoing at camp. Facilities include the dining hall, cabins, pool, campsites, archery range, air rifle range, campfire bowl and chapel. Cabins and campsites are available for rental all year round.

**Double V Scout Ranch** - The Double V Scout Ranch offers a 360-acre desert camping experience with access to mountain hiking trails, a junior Olympic size swimming pool, obstacle course, sports arena, and ATV instruction and riding. Double V Scout Ranch is located near many tourist attractions that Tucson and Southern Arizona have to offer. Our campsites and programs are available for rental all year round.

#### Venturing

Exploring exists to teach important life and career skills to young men and women, ages 11-20, through immersive career experiences and mentorship provided by community and business leaders.
