

Vianney Careaga, 27, is an Eagle Scout, Class of 2013, from Troop 211 in Tucson, AZ. He began his Scouting career in 2002 as a Tiger Cub in Pack 212 and then bridged over into Boy Scouting in 2007. In 2009, Vianney was elected to join the Order of the Arrow (OA), Scouting's National Honor Society. For his contributions to Scouting, he was awarded the OA Vigil Honor in 2012, the OA Founders Award in 2013, and the OA Centurion Award in 2015. Vianney has volunteered in countless roles in the Scouting Program, most notably as a two-non-consecutive term OA Section Chief and as Youth Lead for the Pathfinders Program at the 2019 World Scout Jamboree. One of his favorite Scouting memories was serving on staff for the ArrowTour West Program in the summer

of 2015, where he traveled to 13 western states and helped coordinate 30 centennial events to celebrate the OA's 100th anniversary. Most recently and during Memorial Day Weekend in 2022, Vianney flew to Romania with five other Eagle Scouts to build a new kitchen and dining facilities at a camp so that it could accommodate the influx of Ukrainian refugees fleeing the conflict and humanitarian crisis that had been brought on by the Russian invasion.

While attending The University of Arizona, Vianney was appointed by Governor Doug Ducey, and subsequently confirmed by the Arizona State Senate, to serve on the Arizona Board of Regents as the Student Regent for the 2016-2018 term. In his second year of service on the Board of Regents, he was elected as the Board's Assistant Treasurer and served on numerous committees including the Regents Executive Committee. After graduating from The University of Arizona in 2018, Vianney relocated to Phoenix, AZ to pursue a master's degree in legal studies from the Sandra Day O'Connor College of Law at Arizona State University. He then began his career coordinating the Arizona Human Trafficking Council and Governor's Youth Commission for Governor Doug Ducey. He now serves as the Director of Public Policy for Greater Phoenix Leadership, where he works with 150 CEOs to engage on local, regional, state, and federal policy issues that impact the business community.

Outside of Scouting and work, Vianney enjoys spending time with friends and family through traveling, going on hikes, backpacking, and camping. He has goals to climb the seven summits of the world and the highest peaks in each U.S. state.
